Dear all,

Just a short message this time, as I am in the middle of preparing an array of grant applications (as I'm sure many of you are too).

I recently attended the British Society for Parasitology Spring Meeting in Edinburgh; unusually for the BSP there was a strong focus on veterinary parasitology – no doubt influenced by having a Moredun scientist on the organising committee. My overall impression, and it is very conservative, was that we in NZ more than hold our own in this research area. Long may this continue. Oh and the flat warm beer was wonderful.

One of the criticisms which have been levelled at our membership over the years is that we do not work more closely together (another conservative statement!). In my opinion, recent events, such as the establishment of the Hopkirk Research Institute, which has concentrated much of the parasitology research in AgResearch and Massey onto one site, and the proposal put forward by AgResearch and Lincoln University to amalgamate, provides the opportunity for the various research groups to grow together. My view is that presenting a united front to various (hopefully) interested parties such as government and industry bodies has to be an advantage. It would show we are thinking positively and progressively, and would be good for the image of our discipline. I intend speaking to as many of you as possible over the next few months to gauge your own opinion on how this can be best achieved.
